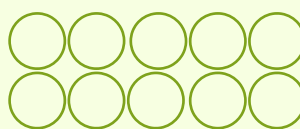

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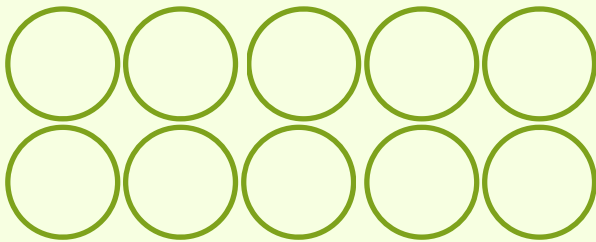


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INTRODUCTION ABOUT US

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In 2025, SASAL, working towards thriving pastoral communities, implemented two broad programmatic initiatives rooted in research, lived experience, and community-led solutions for climate resilience and gender equality. Since the start of project implementation in 2023 through August 2024, SASAL delivered multiple standalone projects, including Greening the ASALs (land restoration), Living in the ASALs' Climate Stories, Women Empowerment, and Urgent Disaster Response. These interventions responded to immediate and visible community needs but also revealed deeper, interconnected challenges linked to climate vulnerability, gender inequality, and structural marginalization within pastoral communities.

In late 2024, informed by organizational learning and sustained community engagement, SASAL developed the Enkang' Model for Climate Resilience and Gender Equality—a holistic, integrated approach designed to address the root causes of these challenges rather than their symptoms. The model draws from the traditional Maasai village (enkang') and applies observational learning as a pathway for promoting sustainable, replicable, and culturally grounded climate solutions.

In January 2025, SASAL produced a documentary on flooding under the Living in the ASALs' Climate Stories project, focusing on Entasopia, Magadi Ward, Kajiado County, Kenya. This work prompted a dedicated research study on the non-economic impacts of flooding, particularly its psychosocial effects on affected residents. The findings, later published in a research report, highlighted mental and emotional distress as a critical yet often overlooked dimension of climate impacts on pastoral communities.

This research directly informed SASAL's advocacy on climate justice and the Loss and Damage agenda, ensuring that pastoralist perspectives—especially on non-economic losses such as mental health, dignity, culture, and social cohesion—were grounded in evidence and lived realities.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

During 2025, the Enkang' Model absorbed several previously standalone interventions, including land restoration and women's empowerment. Core components of the model included water access, solar energy provision, skills training for women to support income generation, climate-resilient traditional housing (manyattas) to promote learning and replicability, sanitation facilities, kitchen gardening, and land restoration activities. By mirroring a typical Maasai village setting, the Enkang' Model demonstrates that climate resilience, food security, environmental conservation, and gender equality are achievable within pastoral contexts without eroding cultural identity.

As a community-led and community-run initiative, the Enkang' Model also generated critical organizational learning. Throughout 2025, SASAL adapted aspects of its internal policies and implementation approaches based on community governance systems, culturally grounded decision-making, and the realities of working with field teams drawn largely from the communities themselves. These adaptations strengthened trust, reduced conflict, and reinforced community ownership and long-term sustainability.

Alongside the Enkang' Model, SASAL implemented Pastoralists Awake: A Common Voice and Agenda, an advocacy initiative amplifying pastoralist voices in climate decision-making spaces. Storytelling under Living in the ASALs' Climate Stories in 2025 was strategically aligned with this advocacy, documenting climate impacts, resilience practices, and evidence-based narratives for broader influence.

While Urgent Disaster Response remained a thematic focus, no emergency response interventions were activated in 2025 due to the absence of immediate disaster events in target communities.

Overall, 2025 marked a strategic turning point for SASAL—from implementing multiple standalone projects to advancing a model-driven, research-informed, and community-governed approach that integrates community infrastructure, gender equality, cultural advocacy, and data-backed climate justice for pastoralist communities.

2025 Projects Overview

ENKANG' MODEL

Holistic, Maasai village-inspired model combining water access, solar energy, climate-resilient housing, skills training for women, sanitation, land restoration, and kitchen gardening.

- Amplifying pastoralist voices in climate decision-making spaces, raising awareness on climate justice, loss & damage, and non-economic climate impacts.

URGENT DISASTER RESPONSE

2025

Project Activities

1. ENKANG' MODEL FOR CLIMATE RESILIENCE & GENDER EQUALITY



- In 2025, construction of the Enkang' Resilient Maasai Village continued, with all planned infrastructure completed by March.
- Following construction, SASAL began community trainings on the basics of climate change, gender equality, and climate adaptation.
- The Village was officially launched in May through a vibrant community-led ceremony.
- In August, skills training programs commenced, focusing on catering and tailoring, with 23 women enrolled over several months.

Project Activities

1. ENKANG' MODEL FOR CLIMATE RESILIENCE & GENDER EQUALITY



- Held regular community consultations with women, men, youth, PWDs, and local leadership to guide ENKANG Village planning and programs.
- Convened ENKANG Village Committee meetings, with members drawn from diverse community groups, to manage day-to-day operations.
- Committee members represented and consulted their groups, including community group ranches, land management structures, and traditional leadership, ensuring equitable participation.
- Strengthened inclusive governance and community ownership of ENKANG Village through these consultations and committee processes.

2. PASTORALISTS AWAKE: A COMMON VOICE & AGENDA



- Our Executive Director participated in CSW69 at the United Nations Headquarters in New York and spoke at a high-level UN Women event on environmental conservation and protection.
- Our Executive Director delivered keynote addresses at the F20 Climate Solutions Forum 2025 in South Africa, opening both the main conference and a side event on gender and just transition.
- A four-person delegation participated in the UN Climate Change Conference in Bonn, Germany, focusing on learning, documentation, and awareness creation.

2. PASTORALISTS AWAKE: A COMMON VOICE & AGENDA



- Implemented the Walk to Brazil Campaign, a one-week symbolic walk designed to mirror the physical, structural, and systemic barriers Indigenous pastoralist youth face in accessing global climate decision-making spaces.
- The campaign used real-time documentation and storytelling to raise awareness on exclusion, mobility challenges, and inequitable access to climate forums, particularly for Indigenous youth and grassroots advocates.

2. PASTORALISTS AWAKE: A COMMON VOICE & AGENDA



- Utilized music and cultural expression as advocacy tools to amplify pastoralist voices in global climate spaces.
- “ESIANA” was released ahead of COP30 (Brazil); a two-person delegation participated (our Executive Director & Musician, Leshao Leshao), including a one-week exhibition and the hosting of an official UNFCCC side event.
- The song was performed live at multiple side events and panels, elevating pastoralist realities and increasing visibility of grassroots initiatives, including ENKANG.
- Hosted the inaugural Climate Justice Concert in December, bringing together youths and the wider community to experience advocacy songs, live performances, brief speeches, and awareness on good governance that promotes climate action, gathering over 1,000 people.

Project Activities

3. ENVISIONING RESILIENCE (CO-IMPLEMENTED PROJECT)



- 7 Women trained on photography to tell adaptation stories and influence national adaptation processes in Kenya.
- Worked together with NAP Global Network, Lensational and the Directorate of Climate Change at the Ministry of Environment.
- Roundtable policy dialogue held at the end bringing together government officials, relevant policy makers, CSO's and the trained photographers who presented their final photo stories.
- Photos/stories produced by the trained photographers uploaded on Lensational's website earning income for women. Same photos will be used in the Directorate's publications on adaptation/climate change etc.

Impact by Project

Enkang' Model – Climate Resilience & Gender Equality

- 20 households (~140 people daily) directly benefiting from our water pipeline.
- ~2,000 goats, 200 donkeys benefitting from water access
- Countless giraffes, antelopes, gazelles, rabbits benefitting from water
- Total of 35 people kitchen garden beneficiaries
- 23 women trained in income generating skills, 40 on basics of climate change and adaptation
- 30+ people per day benefitting from solar energy access
- Our Enkang' village received 300+ visitors, local, international to learn and observe.

Pastoralists Awake – Advocacy & Cultural Mobilization

- Global/National policy events attended: CSW69 (NY), F20 Forum (SA), UN Climate Conference (Bonn), Peer Learning Forum (Namibia), COP 30 with 3-4 delegates sent.
- 3 advocacy songs produced (ESIANA, SUPATI & MANYISHO)
- Newest advocacy song garnered 135,000 plus views on youtube in less than a month of release. 10,000+ challenges on tiktok indicating audience engagement.
- Performed at COP30 on Brazil, for an international audience.

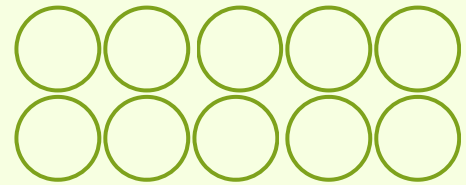


OUR 2026 PLAN

	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Community Training Centre: replacing the current temporary training space with a permanent, heat-friendly structure to support ongoing capacity building for women and the broader community.• Expanded SASAL Field Office: upgrade from the small office at ENKANG to a larger, fully functional facility housing all departments, a boardroom, and meeting spaces to enhance operations and program delivery.• Organizational Vehicles: acquire vehicles to improve access to remote interior areas and extend program reach.

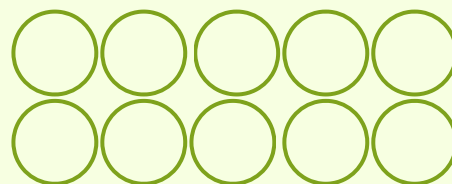
